Jesus heals and forgives. Luke 5 v 17-26

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In the story a group of friends brought a man to Jesus to be healed. They had to carry him onto the roof, break a hole in it and then lower the man through! We are not alone in our journey to draw close to God; church, friends and family can all play a part in helping our faith grow. Draw or write the names of some of the people who help you to draw closer to God.

Find the story in your own Bible. The book of Luke is in the New Testament, find the big number 5 and the small number 17.

Jesus amazed those watching when he healed the man, but they were even more amazed when Jesus said he had authority to forgive sins. Why not take a moment to pray and ask God if there are any areas in your life where you need to say sorry for your behaviour and seek forgiveness?

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There is always more for us to learn and discover about God but we do not have to do this alone. Who are some of the QP

In the story the man's friends knew that Jesus could help their friend. There were obstacles in their way but they did not give up, they kept going till they had brought their friend to Jesus.

Is there an area in your life where you need to keep going in spite of obstacles today?















Have you ever wondered why we use bread and wine to remember Jesus' sacrifice on the cross?

The bread represents Jesus' body which was broken on the cross.

Bread is mentioned many times in the Bible. In John 6 v **35** Jesus said "I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never go hungry. And whoever believes in me will never be thirsty." Just like God gave the Israelites bread to feed them in the wilderness, we can trust that God will give us the things we need each day. Just like Jesus, we can pray "give us this day our daily bread" and ask God to give us all the things we need.

The wine represents the blood of Jesus.

In the Old Testament animals had to be sacrificed as a blood offering to God, the blood of the sacrifices showed God they repented of their sins. In **Exodus 12** we read about the first Passover. The Israelites painted their doorways with blood from young lambs or goats, God protected them from the plague of death he had sent against their enemies. When Jesus died on the cross, he was the ultimate sacrificial lamb for all of us, his blood was shed so that all our sins could be forgiven.

Communion is our way of remembering what Jesus did, suffering and dying on the cross to take the punishment for all of our sins, shedding his blood as a sacrifice for us all.



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Imagine being the disciples hearing this for the first time, how do you think it made them feel? Sometimes we can get into habits or patterns of how we do something. When we take communion, it is not supposed to be a tradition or habit it is an opportunity to really think about God's love for us. Ask God to help you discover something new the next time you share communion.
