Discussion

Read: Ecclesiastes 1 v 12-18

A question for adults to ask children

The writer says that he tried to learn about everything that happens on the earth, why do you think he found it so hard?

The earth is huge, the universe is even bigger, the more we learn about the world around us, the more we also see the things that are wrong in the world. The world we live in is full of messiness and mistakes, no wonder the writer was so frustrated.

The good thing is that God who is bigger than the universe sees and understands everything, when we don't understand things or find ourselves upset or frustrated we can go to God and speak to Him in prayer.

A question for children to ask adults

What was your favourite subject to learn about when you were my age?

Family Activity 1

Read Ecclesiastes 1 v 6

Use the template on p3 to make your own windmill.

You will need a split pin or you could use a pin badge to create the centre.

Attach the windmill to a straw or piece of card.



A verse to remember



Ecclesiastes 12 v 13

Honour God and obey his commands, because this is all people must do.

This is the conclusion that the writer of Ecclesiastes come to after thinking about all they knew of the world. Try to learn this verse together, you could come up with some actions to help you remember it or decorate the verse on a piece of paper or card together and put it up somewhere to remind you of it through the week.

Family Activity 2

Read Ecclesiastes 4 v 9-12

Our friends and family are there to help us and support us through the good times and the difficult times.

Set up an obstacle course using furniture from around your home and see if you can complete it as a family all staying connected!

Use a scarf or piece of fabric to join family members together at the ankle and complete a three-legged race.

If you have an odd number of people in your family or just two you could set up a course and time each pairing, can you beat your previous score?



Active Prayers

Ecclesiastes 9 v 13-18

These verses speak of the importance of having wise leaders who seek peace and not war. It is good to pray for our own leaders in our schools, workplaces, churches and nation. We can also pray for situations all over the world

Work together to pray some 'follow the leader' prayers, one person prays a simple prayer e.g. Dear God thank you for my teacher. You could also come up with an action to go with your prayer. Everybody else should follow the leader and echo the prayer and action.

The next person could add something to the prayer or pray their own. Everybody should then follow them by echoing the prayer and action again.


Family Activity 1

How to make a windmill

Print your windmill onto paper or card.

Decorate the windmill with your own design.

Cut out the square and carefully cut along the dotted lines from the corners towards the middle.

Pierce holes where there are dots in the corners and centre. You might want to ask an adult to help with this. You will also need a hole in the top of your straw or paper stem.

Fold the points with holes into the centre of the windmill, pass the split pin through all four corners, the middle and your stem. Open out the split pin to secure.

Test your windmill, you may need to loosen it a little to help it spin.
